In a few days we will enter the Season of Advent and turn our thoughts once again to the wonderful gift God gave us Christmas morning – the gift of a Messiah. We use key

words to navigate the season, words like Faith, Hope, Joy, Love and Peace. Each of these words builds on the others to develop a full understanding of what God has done.

We remember that we are the people of a Faith that is based on believing intellectually that God is our Lord and Savior and then relying on and trusting in that belief in all that we do. Faith means we love our God and our neighbor with all that we are. This Faith then gives us Hope, hope that this world can change, hope that we can change, hope that Christ will come again. Hope means believing in something that is to come and then living expectantly, looking every day for God's promises to be fulfilled again.

When we think of our Faith and the Hope that it gives, we realize that all we know and have and worship came from God's Love for us, a love we are supposed to reach for and share. This word Love, in light of the Cross, means complete self-giving, a standard we are to strive for as we live our lives in God's kingdom. Once we realize the true meaning of Love, we erupt like heaven on Christmas morning, when all of heaven saw the birth of Christ and erupted into singing: Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace toward all on who God's favor now rests. They were so full of Joy; they could not help it. And they sang of Peace, not the absence of war, but God's peace, a peace that means becoming one with God, so that no matter what, nothing can separate us from God's love---forever.

Advent has five stages, each building on the previous, each adding to our understanding of all that God has done. This year, think on these words, one a week, building on your understanding as you proceed through the season, sing a Carol that reminds you of the word, share a moment in prayer with God, asking for more understanding of each word. Then, armed with the season, find others and share it, not intellectually, but by some deed or devotion. May God bless us all richly in this season of remembrance!

This award recognizes the dedicated effort of all Hope Center Volunteers, the commitment of every member of DCU, the support of our grantors and all those who make financial commitments to the Hope Center. OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION | The Hope Center (Petersburg)

The Hope Center, which serves as the community outreach of Downtown Churches United, Inc. (DCU), contributes more than 14,000 hours of service to the Petersburg community annually. Providing hunger and financial relief services, The Hope Center operates the Daily Feeding Program, which includes a food pantry, help with paying utility bill payments, and regular blood pressure screenings. The food pantry operates approximately 20 hours a week and distributes groceries to an average of 175 households a week, and the Daily Feeding Program provides a hot lunch for more than 80 people a day.

When I was a child, my mother insisted we be seated in our pew before the Prelude began. My dad agreed because he loved to listen to the beautiful music of our organ. I assumed my mother wanted the time to catch her breath after getting herself, three kids (two boys who had to be checked to make sure shirts were tucked, ears were clean, and cow licks were plastered down), and my grandma fed, dressed, and delivered to church. My dad took care of himself. One day I asked her why the urgency when many people arrived later than we did. She told me that when she was a young girl growing up in Second, she was taught to take the Prelude as a time to settle herself and when she was calm, to offer a prayer: "Dear God, open my ears to hear the message you have for me today. Open my brain to understand what you are trying to say. Open my heart to accept your words. And, open my hands and feet to do what you want me to do. Amen."

The calendar tells us that Advent starts on November 29 and we will begin to celebrate the birthday of our Lord. During the four weeks, we will prepare our hearts and minds to recognize the tremendous gift God has given us. Try this little prayer during the Prelude to see if the message becomes clearer to you.

Approved the minutes of the Congregational Meeting of October 25, 2020 and the Stated Session Meeting October 25, 2020.

Celebrating Arch's 20th Anniversary of Ordination

It has become a tradition in our presbytery to recognize the ordination anniversary of ministers on the occurrence of each 5-year increment of service. And while the anniversary is recognized on the floor of a presbytery meeting once a year, each minister's church is encouraged to commemorate it as well. And so, on Sunday November 8th we celebrated and congratulated Arch on his having attained 20 years of ordained ministry.

Most of our church's members and friends have never seen Arch's impressive resume but do recognize that he has been first a talented and accomplished attorney and then a compassionate, caring and inspiring minister whose extensive work and experience have greatly benefitted Second Church through going on 8 years of pastoral care and leadership. I believe in One God in whom I live and serve and have my being. I know God in three personages – father, son and sustaining and empowering Spirit. I know God created all from nothing, sustains all because of love, and has rescued us from our rejection of God, through Jesus, the Christ, the most perfect gift ever given in God's grace. I accept the Bible as God's inspired Word and rely on it daily to guide my life. I accept Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior and believe He is the way, and the truth and the light of God, our only hope for salvation. I believe in the sustaining presence of the Holy Spirit, with me always, guiding and enlightening me as to the mysteries of our faith. I believe God has called me to serve as Christ served, to love as Christ loved, to preach and teach as Christ preached and taught. I believe in the Covenants God has made through history and of the New Covenant made for me through Christ. I realize without Christ I am nothing. I believe in the eternal life Christ promised and I recognize that

it begins now, in this place and lasts forever. I acknowledge that I am a sinner, without hope except for the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Through Him my sin has been removed. I cannot believe God can love each of us so much to give Jesus to stand in our place at the time of judgment. I am so unworthy but so loved.
