In Psalm 137 is the well- known line, "By the waters of Babylon, we laid down our harps; there we sat and wept when we remembered our former home."

The words come from one of those who had been held in a foreign land against his will as a spoil of war, a man who had just recently returned to his ancestral home in Jerusalem and was remembering the awful time that had just ended. This could be our song today as we begin our return to a new normal following our own Covid-19 exile. We remember how tough these last 15 months have been, where we were confined and separated. We remember the times when we could not sing in joy, the times when we worried about life itself and the times we worried about the risk that waited around the next corner for us and our loved ones. We remember how sad this time was; but it is going. Life can resume; relationships can be restored; we can live and love again. We can see each other again.

The Psalmist remembered that even though 75 years of exile was beyond bad, he and his family had not forgotten their Lord, had not forgotten their home. As the doors open and the restrictions pass, my hope is that none of us has forgotten our Lord or the love of this church for its extended family. My hope is that we can sing out about the faithfulness of our God and the gift of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, who has never left us. We should all give thanks on our knees that we can return from this exile to the love that is Christ's Church here in Petersburg.

I have missed you dearly; I have prayed for you daily; I have remembered painfully the long time we could not sing our song together. Now, we can come home; let it be a time of rejoicing that we can come into the House of the Lord once more; let it be a time of thanks that we have been preserved, that the Virus did not get us; and let it be a time of hope knowing we can once again look to the future and ask, "Loving God, what do you want us to do here in your church?"

This last line is the best: I look forward to seeing you in the pews again.

170th ANNIVERSARY SECOND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AND WW2

The years of 1941-1945 were turbulent in America. Second Church was caught up in its own problems. Our pastor, Dr. Daniel Caldwell, resigned on June 30, 1941. For the next 39 Sundays a variety of men filled the pulpit. They included our assistant pastor, student assistants, missionaries on furlough, chaplains from Camp Lee, and pastors from Union Theological Seminary. The bulletin provided warnings, I mean information, on each one to allow members to plan accordingly.

On Mar. 29, 1942, Dr. William McIlwaine (Dr. Mc) was installed as our 10th pastor. Using our bulletins and surviving documents for the war years, I'll describe some of what was happening here. Looking at the bulletins, one would not know of the attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on December 7, 1941. It was business as usual until Feb. 8, when a list of 6 more men was included as joining the Defense Service. The bulletin of June 14 declares that the Wed. night prayer service would be "short and sweet" (whatever that means to Presbyterians) to allow members to get home before the blackout.

At the request of the Session, Dr. Mc sent the first letter we have "To our Men in the Service", dated Jan. 21, 1943. At that time 68 men had joined the armed forces, ranging from raw recruits to a Lieutenant Colonel. A Session member had joined up as had sons of four other Session members, including his own son, Robert.

The next letter, dated April 13, 1943 was addressed to "Dear Boys (and Girl) in the Service". There were now 79 men and one girl (Janet Roth, Nurses' Naval Corps) enlisted. He spoke of a reception hosted by the ladies Bible Classes to celebrate his first year as pastor and I quote "Yes, church receptions can be deadly; but they can be delightful too". It makes you wonder what they were up to.

Nov.10, 1943 is the date of his next letter. It is filled with general news of vacation bible school, Family night carousing, evening services, the weather and letters from two servicemen. Sinclaire Womack in Australia is quoted as saying that "T-bone steaks could be had at any time ("Dr. Mc responds "Say, boy, what is a T-Bone steak? "). Joe Best wrote of church services in New Guinea.

Second's Defense Service Committee (DSC), composed of one man and 5 women, wrote the next letter on Feb. 4, 1944. Their count of serving members was 106 men and 4 girls. Mention is made of Miss Margaret Severs (Related to Alice Martin) being hired on Jan. 1 as Director of Religious Education and of the pledges and War bonds totaling over ten thousand dollars to be used to build a Sunday school building. The back of the letter has 110 names of our servicemen and women, in alphabetical order, their rank and branch of service.

March 28, 1944 brings Dr. Mc describing an incident in his back yard to the 112 service members. He and his daughter were in their orchard when 5 of the Navy's newest planes appeared flying low, when one of them wigged wagged its wings. That was the signal from his son Robert, who was stationed at Norfolk.

The (DSC) penned the next letter on July 22, 1944. They report the bad news received by the pastor from the Navy that his son Robert (Bobby) Dunn McIlwaine was lost in the Battle of Saipan. Judge and Mrs. J.J. Temple were notified by the War Dept. that their son Robert was

missing in action in Western France. Mr. and Mrs. John W. Mayes were also notified that their son John was missing. The number of our service members was now 119 men and 4 girls.

February 5, 1945 is the date of the last letter we have. It is also from the Defense Service Committee. The first paragraph describes a motion picture playing at the Century theatre.

It was called "Winged Victory" and was welcomed with Camp Lee bands and organizations like the American Legion staging a parade on Sycamore Street, really jamming traffic, to quote the writer. It appears Petersburg was experiencing a "Brownout" as temperatures dropped to 10 degrees and all unnecessary lights were to be turned off to conserve coal. The good news was that Judge and Mrs. J.J. Temple received a letter from their son Robert, who was a prisoner of the Germans.

On a sheet of Dr. McIlwaine's undated stationary is a list of four young men killed in the war.

John Burns Mayes - Navy/ on a submarine in the S. Pacific/ Missing since July 1, 1944.

Ensign Robert Dunn McIlwaine – Navy Air Corps/ Killed in action June 12, 1944, over Saipan in the South Pacific.

Staff Sgt. Elmer Lewis McKesson – Killed in action while serving with the 83rd Infantry in France, July 12, 1944.

Radio Gunner John A. Mann – Army Air Corps/Missing since Jan. 2, 1945 after a flight over Germany.

October 1, 1944's bulletin includes an "In Memory of" entry which includes Robert Dunn McIlwaine and Elmer Lewis McKesson.

In the May 13, 1945 bulletin, the deaths of Elmer McKesson and John Mann are listed as are Grant C. Crumpler, Robert M. Friend Jr., William W. Lawhon, R. Duncan Mann, John W. Moore and Woodrow W. Moore, wounded in action.

The Sept. 9, 1945 bulletin reports word was received that John Albert Mann, reported missing for many months was killed Jan. 2, 1945.
