

We have not been together for way too long, and I have missed our communion. My prayer each day is that none of us contracts the



deadly disease that is circulating and that we all can meet again together in God's house.

To move us toward a new normal, we have started a process of Virtual

Worship by creating a new website and recording a new sermon there each week. We next plan to add A Time for Children using short vignettes with object lessons within a few days and we have begun the development of a week day Bible study of the Gospel of John. Maybe, others will be helped in this difficult time by our witness.

In the meantime, I want to share with you a thought from the Easter Season that rarely gets attention because of the focus on Palm Sunday and Easter itself. In John 13 at the Feast of the Passover, or as we call it -The Last Supper, Jesus got up during supper, took a towel and a basin of water, and began washing his disciples' feet. They protested, but he continued. When he finished Jesus told His disciples, since I did this for you, then you ought to do it for one another. Foot-washing was the lowest of jobs. It was done by servants or slaves, not by the Lord of the house or the Lord of all.

But Jesus was saying to them, this is an example of what I want of you, that you serve each other!

This is a time when we need to remember all who serve, who reach out, who remember, who care for us. And, we ought to remember Christ's challenge to each of us to be servants for others -- not by taking risks, but by telephone, by notes, by the internet, by a remembrance. I saw two of you planting a new garden, another mowing the grass, another taking food, another checking on a sick member. The list is long and growing. On television we see the first responders and the health care workers. Thank God for their service, and, thank God for your service.

As Ecclesiastes 3 teaches, there is a time for everything under the sun, and this virus too shall pass, but our love for each other and our service must never end, just as God's love for each of you will never end.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Recognizing that area churches would begin to experience some financial difficulties given the COVID-19 pandemic, the Presbytery of the James issued Inspire checks to its churches. Second was the recipient of a \$2,000 check for which we are extremely grateful and have acknowledged the same to Presbytery. This will certainly assist us in trying to meet our expenses which continue to come in. This \$2,000 donation was not received until April so it is not reflected in the March figures being reported here.

Additionally, the church applied for and just received notification that it has been awarded a SBA Payroll Protection Program loan/grant. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act created the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) administered by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The program is designed to provide small employers, including non-profits and churches, with immediate access to cash to allow them to survive the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The loans convert into grants if certain criteria are met, which includes that at least 75 percent of the loan eligible for forgiveness must be used for payroll costs with other eligible costs being rent/mortgages and utilities.

OFFICE & PERSONNEL COMMITTEE: Pattie Bonham Church Staffing During the Shutdown

As all of you know we have been in shutdown mode since it was mandated by our governor and implemented by subsequent guidelines issued by our presbytery. What you probably don't know is what has really been going on with our church staff and office during this situation.

Although the church is officially closed to gatherings of 10 or more the office is open to those who need to stop by for quick drop-offs or other simple errands that do not involve a grouping of people. A number of faithful members have stopped by to leave their weekly offerings which is so appreciated. Also, collections of food and supplies continue as givers are able to respond to this increasing need in our community. Please feel free to stop by during normal office hours but be advised to call ahead to verify that someone will be here. Our staff, most of whom are in the vulnerable older adult category, must have the flexibility to see to their own needs which may require that they not be on hand exactly at normal office hours, so do call ahead before coming. Also, please remember to follow CDC guidelines and maintain appropriate social distancing and wear a face mask if possible.

As our church staff continue to work throughout the shutdown here's a sample of what they've been up to:

Pastor Arch has been providing us with a weekly online worship opportunity that shares scripture, prayer and a sermon for the week. In addition, he stays well ahead of the worship schedule by selecting texts and preparing sermons for worship services in future weeks. He has been called upon to officiate at funerals and remains in touch remotely with those in need of pastoral care. His duties as moderator of session continue with session's online cyber meetings several of which have taken place during the shutdown.

Music Director, John Michael, has been planning music selections for our choir and handbells into the next few months and conducting his own practicing in the meantime. This has to be done in co-ordination with the texts and sermons planned by Arch so John Michael has been moving forward in step with that.

Our Administrative Assistant, Becky, has been very busy with the church's new membership database system. The recent conversion from the old software system allowed the new system to be populated with the names of all of our members but didn't format that data, so Becky has to manually identify each member, link that with a family unit, and verify and update all related information for that member. Happily, she has been assisted by Kay Snavely who attended the database training session with her. Also during the shutdown Becky and Susan Lobaugh have been temporarily deputized by the Finance Committee to serve as counters to handle our weekly contributions which are deposited at the bank and then recorded in the new database. Lastly, Becky and Susan are also updating the church register book with manual entries that record births, deaths, marriages, baptisms, confirmations and ordinations for our members.

Sexton, William Spencer, always has opportunities beyond his weekly cleaning routines. Just like our own houses the church building has deep cleaning needs that may not be tended to on a weekly basis but have to be seen to as time permits. The shutdown affords just that opportunity.
